Assisted by Connor's grandma, Peg Wallis, on Connor's left in the photo, the family brings teams of golfers to the Sycamore Country Club for a day of golf and a full-course evening dinner for 175 guests at the Regale Center in Sycamore, donated by Kelly's friends, Jill and Srdan Selimberovic. This sterling third-party fundraiser has raised \$136,000 since its launching, and Connor, who has had three major and five minor surgeries with us, has grown to be a young man before our very eyes. He's a fine golfer and plays in Shriners Scramble every year. He was pleased that his doctor, Pravin Patel, and Dr. Patel's son attended as well. "We had a great time with Connor, his family, and their friends," Dr. Patel reports with a big smile.

Kelly and Connor are excited about the 2017 Shriners Scramble, for it will mark the 10th anniversary of the event—and they say, "It's going to be the greatest of all Shriners Scrambles!"

Kenosha, one of the most successful and active Shrine Clubs in our area, has engaged the entire community in such programs as manning beer garden bashes, hospital night to give everyone the opportunity to learn what is happening at our hospital, and other exciting events attractive to both Shrine and non-Shrine friends.

On this particular trip, they brought in the afghan (photo right), made by long-time needle artist Fran Rice, who had for years produced lap blankets for our kids and who recently died. This is her final gift to children.
